An Interview with John Woolcott, one of our HPC longest serving members. By Guido Kelly

- 1. How long have you been a Vincentian? and how much have you enjoyed this aspect of Vincentian work? I have been a Vincentian since 1970, when I became a member of the Regina Mundi Conference here in Hamilton. This was a true growing experience for me, being in my early 20s, working alongside my new Saint Vincent De Paul brothers and sisters who were all so dedicated to serving the needs of the less fortunate in the community of the Hamilton Particular Council.

Celebrates

60 years of its Aggregation

Since its foundation date, January 18,1961 the Saint Patrick Parish Conference of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul has been helping our less fortunate brothers and sisters, by carrying out our mission statement "living the Gospel message"

by serving Christ through our neighbours in need with love, respect, justice and joy". Our Conference was aggregated on January 7, 1963, which now leads us into our 60th anniversary year of aggregation in 2023. Our conference membership has grown from 10 to 25 members. Ten of our members each have over 20 years of service and they keep the rest of the members grounded and committed to the core purpose of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul. We have a longer term plan to cross train members and implement a succession planning strategy. Our conference is a major supporter to the Project Share (food bank) Christmas Food Program, through financial assistance and our Vincentians working with members of Project Share to distribute aid. This summer, in partnership with the Saint Catharines Central Council and East Niagara Particular Council, 35 Elementary School children from the Region made lifetime memories as they attended summer camp. The conference also provides gift cards for clothing and food to those in need of emergency assistance in Niagara Falls downtown area. In the past, we have also assisted with the purchase of appliances for families and mobility aid for people with disabilities. The conference has liaison people working with the four (4) downtown Elementary Schools (both public and separate school boards) by which we

have provided clothing, hygiene items and financial assistance to students in an effort to lessen the stigma of poverty. In photo at right, some of our members deliver coats to the Principal to hand out to some of the school children. The work the liaison people have done is leading to other programs that will benefit the school children. Our members have prepared and served food at the Niagara Falls Community Outreach (Soup Kitchen) for 25 years. Our conference is indebted to the parishioners of our church for their generous donations. We also get support with monies raised through OLG at Delta Bingo, as well as partnerships with other Service groups and small businesses. The key to our continued success going forward would be expanding partnerships with other stakeholders in the community. Currently, we have partnerships with the Carmelites, the Knights of Columbus 1652 Council and the Stamford Centre Volunteer Firemen as well as a few local businesses that have been keen to support the conference,

especially with programs at the Elementary Schools. Our members also volunteer at the SSVP store in Niagara Falls. This store is run by the Particular Council. On occasion, we provide vouchers to those in need to shop at the store.

Saint John of the Cross Conference

Mississauga

Our Conference represents the outreach of the St. John of the Cross (SJOC) parishioners and parish which is located in the north-west corner of Mississauga, Ontario, the nation's 7th largest city by population. Our Conference is one of six that are under the umbrella of Peel North Particular Council which in turn falls under the jurisdiction of the Greater Toronto Central Council (GTCC). Our members

meet every 2nd Thursday of each month. Our Conference was started on September 4th, 1990 and plays a vital role in carrying out the missionary works of the Society. Our 35 members are committed and faithful to the Vincentian mission and ideals, and we serve approximately 75 families in our local community in a variety of ways. In 2021, our members made 342 family visits and gave out 696 Mi-Way (Mississauga Transit) bus tickets as well as \$18,295.00 worth of grocery cards. In addition, our Conference is involved in Bundle-Up Weekend collections in April and October each year. We were engaged in Thanksgiving Food drives – the Catholic Schools in our Parish give generously to this Food Drive. We also pack Christmas Hampers for our neighbours in

need that we serve throughout the year. Our Conference is twinned with Our Lady of the Angels Conference in Kingston, Jamaica and we keep regular contact with them via email. In September this year, we launched the Registered Education Savings Program (RESP) / Canada Learning Bond (CLB) project under the Seeds of Hope (SOH). Two weeks ago, we treated our parishioners to coffee and cookies after each of our 5 weekend masses. At this time, we also launched our fundraising raffle, with

the top prize being a 50" Samsung TV; all proceeds will assist us with our Christmas hampers. Our Annual Summer Needathon, a fundraising event eagerly participated in by our parishioners in support of our Backto-School assistance to families has been on hold since 2020. The event is a 3/5/10 kilometer-family fun walk and cycle along Lake Aquitaine and Lake Wabukayne both man-made scenic lakes right in our neighbourhood. Our Conference was recognized in February 2021 by the City of Mississauga for its outreach to those in need in the peak of the pandemic and received "The Covid Hero Award" for our efforts. We continue to make drop-off deliveries in lieu of home visits for families on the



St. Peter's Conference Goderich

Goderich is the county seat of Huron County. It is located on the eastern shore of Lake Huron at the mouth of the Maitland River. Visitors as well as townsfolk are amazed at its superb sunsets as viewed looking west over the Lake. While our parish was established in 1834, the SSVP St. Peter's Conference was not established until 1983 and our

Conference has been serving the needy of Goderich since that time. Once we opened the doors to the church basement on Saturday mornings, we just grew as an organization. In 1990, we celebrated the grand opening of our brand-new Thrift Store. As our store thrived, our services also expanded to branch out in our service to the needy. We established a food bank which has grown in size and scope over the years as we assist more and more people. For instance, each month, in 2021, we served approx. 300 individuals, all from the Goderich area, through the food bank. In 2013, we opened a second store, Parsons Used Furniture. At Parsons, our patrons may shop for furniture, appliances, lamps, and other household goods while the Thrift Store location offers Family Services, clothing, linens, books, etc. We run a Soup Corner out of our Thrift Store and have served over 1000 people in one month prior to "Covid". We are now happy that we have been able to get our "Soup Corner" restarted. Sales from both stores support our special works projects such as the food bank, daily soup pot, fire & domestic violence support, emergency assists of heat, hydro, shelter, clothing, dental, furniture, and clothing. We also have a Health Care

Aids Loans Cupboard that loans walkers, wheelchairs, crutches, shower chairs, etc. for as long as needed. Christmas Hampers, "Ring & Run" programs and the Walk-A-Mile Shoe Program are some of our favorite services! The "Ring & Run" is when we have learned of a family who needs help but will never ask....so we get lots of goodies together to meet their needs (could be clothing, food, etc.), sneak it to their door, ring the bell and RUN! They never know where it came from or how it came to be (we love secrets!). Budget and life skills support are available, which includes everything from new recipes to time with a financial planner. Christian items such as Bibles, pictures, etc. are always free. We constantly strive to renew ourselves and be adaptable to the specific needs of those that do turn to us for help and to meet each one where they are. We understand that poverty does not necessarily involve needing material goods as one can be poor in spirit, support, family, or health.

We are immensely grateful for the many volunteers that give of their time and talents and their heart to keep the mission possible! They really are the backbone of our ability to serve in the community, while our faith in God remains our cornerstone.

Ozanam Education Fund

Ozanam Education Fund (OEF) background:

The Ozanam Education Fund is an Ontario Regional Council program that is focused on helping people to rise out of the cycle of poverty by providing them with resources so they can upgrade their education with the goal of obtaining a decent job. One of the key factors that contributes to generational poverty is the lack of an education. The main obstacle is the lack of funds for tuition, computer equipment, food, transportation, and other necessities. Ten years ago, ONRC recognized this fundamental need for help to break out of poverty and as a result created the Ozanam Education Fund. Because our Vincentians are in direct contact with people in these situations, they are in a unique position to help us in identifying worthy candidates.

The program works on a referral basis. Our Vincentian members identify situations where individuals are struggling financially to obtain further education or training needed to obtain a decent job. This may be

struggling financially to obtain further education or training needed to obtain a decent job. This may be expenses for attending University, College, trades, or other skills training. The program promotes taking an overall review of the personal funding capability for the person in need. The Fund application and the associated worksheet assists in this assessment. Applications are submitted by a Vincentian sponsor to the Fund committee for review. Supporting submissions are made by both the Vincentian sponsor and the applicant. Review is done by the committee making awards to the applicants as best as they can with the limited funds available. When awards are made the funds are "passed down" to the appropriate SSVP conference or council for local administration (paying bills). Applications should be made by the Vincentian most familiar with the situation. The full Application-Award-Tax process is detailed on our ONRC website.

Who we have helped:

The ONRC Ozanam Education Fund has been in operation for 10 years and has made 342 awards providing over \$657,000 of assistance for help with people's education. Most of those we have helped are from families that are living in poverty with burdens of debt, medical problems, job loss, and the like. A significant number are from single parent families where the parent has young children, and they are trying to move from a low paying (often part time job) to one that allows them to live with some dignity. We have also helped many single mothers get an education so they could move on to a better paying job and better living conditions. **Impact:**

We have received many thank you notes from the people that we have helped explaining how the financial assistance has made a difference in their lives in helping them get an education. We have also received feedback from sponsors that have noted the positive impact that the program has had on their families in helping them work their way out of poverty.

How you can help:

We call on our Vincentians to help identify someone that may be in dire need of help to get an education that will allow them rise out of the poverty cycle. Investigate the situation and explore how that person may benefit from the OEF program. Financially, the program is funded by "pass-ups" to ONRC from Conferences and Councils identified for the OEF. We encourage donations from Charity Foundations, Corporations, or personal donations. If you know of a Charity Foundation or a Corporation interested in contributing to our program, please reach out to them. Most donors like the fact that we have zero overhead expenses, and all contributions go directly to support those in need. We encourage both your financial donations to this worthy cause as well as your efforts to reach out to someone in need of an education; it will change someone's life.

"The Gains from North of Sixty"

Creek was thrilled to take the lead role in packing a seacan for shipment to Coral Harbour, a community in the North of Sixty program. It was our first solo endeavour to fill a sea container with non-perishable items for the community called Coral Harbour, situated on Southampton Island on the North coast of Hudson Bay. This area has a population of about 1100 and typical of most northern communities more than 60% are youth and children. Because of their location on the open waters of Hudson Bay, Coral

Harbour endures more turbulent weather than communities on the mainland. They had been waiting several years for a St. Vincent de Paul Conference in the south to ship them foods that are usually unavailable and unaffordable on the island. The process and the journey from receiving the container in May to its departure late August and arrival to Coral Harbour November 8, 2022. Our first step was to obtain a 20 by 8.5 feet sea container (seacan) which was purchased by Ontario Regional Council. The seacan was inspected for holes and cracks that could cause water or rodents to enter and spoil the goods. Next was deciding on a safe and accessible central location for conferences in both Hamilton and Hamilton West's conferences. We received a list of what were essential goods and what were "niceties" for the children's after-school programs. Like all communities in the North, they only receive one shipment a year. The journey

takes 2 months but this year it took considerably longer because of snow, wind and lack of ice that calms the choppy waters. Turbulent seas prevent ships from sending out barges loaded with food to the island. This shipment was a joint effort among the conferences of Hamilton and Hamilton West Particular Councils. Each conference chose the items and mode of support. Some donated money, some purchased the goods and other approached their parishioners to donate these goods. As the goods were collected, they were stored in a member's garage for later sorting and packing. Several hours were spent by many helpers finding the best way to secure the boxes on the skids. Finally, the seacan packing day of Aug 3rd was upon us. All the stored boxes were trucked to the parking lot of St. Francis Xavier Church in Stoney Creek. The buzz of animated Vincentians, cars, and trucks permeated the

neighbourhood. It took many hands to pack, wrap, and pull the pallets jacks in place.

The charged atmosphere, the ringing church bells, and the chatter added to an incredible feeling of elation, camaraderie, and hope for a safe journey to Coral Harbour. The seacan would soon leave Stoney Creek for trucking to Montreal, where it would be loaded on a ship, and transferred to a barge near the coast of Coral Harbour. The shipment was scheduled to arrive October 24. However, due to the weather elements of wind, snow, and lack of ice to calm the rough waters of Hudson Bay, the ship was detoured to a community much further north and finally arrived on the shores of Coral Harbour on the 8th of November. The photo (right) shows a happy group of

Feeding the Hungry in Goderich

As we approach the New Year of 2023, we will mark our 40th year of the founding of our SSVP St. Peter's Conference in Goderich in 1983. Our food bank started feeding the needy of Goderich and area in 1985.

Through the food bank alone, we have served up to 100 families (290 individuals) per month in this area. We supply our friends with food hampers when they call on us for help. Each food hamper offers a 7–10-day supply and is always made uniquely for the person(s) receiving it according to their likes and dislikes, allergies, diet, and cooking abilities. We would pack differently for someone who is homeless compared to someone who is legally blind or has a room in a boarding house or motel. Some like to do their own "shopping" while others prefer us to pack for them using a created list that has their preferences and needs. Every hamper offers perishables (bread, milk, margarine, eggs, fresh fruit & produce, cheese slices), as well as a choice of frozen meats (fish, chicken, beef, pork, and chicken). We may also include hygiene products, paper products and non-perishables as to their needs. We

encourage people to try new recipes and sometimes have samples for them to try – like chickpea cookies! Our Christmas hampers are similar, but they also have the choice of the main meat – roast beef, ham, turkey, or pork loin roast along with all the seasonal treats. A small gift and socks or gloves are always included along with a "stocking" of treats. Along the way, we realized that we were still missing a group – the ones who were never going to ask. Thus, the Daily Soup Pot began in 2016. Soup

and buns are available in the store to all during the opening hours. A note on the unmonitored donation jar says, "You are welcome to leave a donation for yourself and perhaps a donation for the ones who can't." No one knows who is simply enjoying the social "lunch while you shop" or if it may be the only meal they enjoy. This promotes a warm, welcoming atmosphere. At our Soup Corner, we have served over 1000 people in one month. We are very grateful to our donors and our amazing volunteers who continue to give of themselves with their hearts, talents, and time. More than this, we continue to be amazed and humbled by God's continuing grace, provisions, and blessings.

THE BENEFITS OF TWINNING (our Story from Antigua & Barbuda)

St. Francis of Assisi Conference is located in the city of St. John's on the beautiful Island of Antigua & Barbuda which is well known for fun, sun, sea, and sand – most definitely a haven for Tourists!

As a member of the St. Francis of Assisi Conference, my view of the island took on a different outlook as the other members and myself engaged in weekly house to house visitations. We encountered people living in dire

circumstances that we never knew still existed. We were of the view that the Conference was in no position to cater to the basic needs of those we visited. However, once we familiarized ourselves with our Vincentian vocation, it then became clear to us that "where there's a will, there's a way!"

So, we embarked on a Monthly Cake Sale held after Mass on the last Sunday of every month and an Annual Pre-Independence Luncheon held on the last Sunday in October every year as the means through which we would service those in need. The monies we made by these fund-raisers did assist us in our efforts to be of service. However, the demand was so much greater that we had to prioritize our distribution.

I can vividly remember our excitement when we learnt about the Twinning Program back in 2012. We immediately applied and were elated when Our Lady of the Assumption Conference in Stoney Creek, Ontario, Canada agreed to be our Twinning Partner. Over the years, our relationship has most certainly evolved. Thanks to technology, we have been able to have "live" meetings (exchanging our Agendas) and to pray the Rosary together. It was fun to teach our Twinning Partners a taste of

our Caribbean fellowship. Over the years, the funds received from our Twinning Partners were most instrumental in enabling us to do the following: **Built an out-house for Mr. Joseph; provide daily lunches for four (4) Shut-Ins and**

Two (2) HIV patients; purchase School Supplies for three (3) children; assist a single parent with school fees; assist a cancer patient with medical expenses; host a Christmas party for the girls at the Good Shepherd Home (this is a home for abused girls); provide pampers and bed pads for our Shut-Ins; purchase groceries for an unemployed single mother and an elderly woman.

More recently, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and the protocols that were in place, we were unable to engage in all our usual outreach programs. However, in December 2021, we did reach out to approximately thirty-five (35) families with our Christmas Packages. I am enclosing a few pictures which were taken to share with our Twinning Partners.

In closing, let me take this opportunity to express our gratitude to our Twinning Partners from Canada for working along with us to make a positive difference where the need exists.

In the words of St. Vincent De Paul, "Our vocation is to embrace the hearts of all men, to do what the Son of God did, he who came into the world to set it on fire. It is true therefore that I am sent not only to love God but to make him loved. It is not enough to love God if my neighbor does not love him."
