Society of Saint Vincent de Paul

Honours its founder in Ontario

George Manly Muir (1807 -1882)



Most Vincentians quickly learn that our Society was formed in Paris, France in 1833. However, have Ontario Vincentians ever wondered when did the Society start in Ontario and by whom? George Manly Muir, who was born in 1807 in Amherstburg, Ontario, resided in Montreal where, in 1833, he met and married Sophie Place, who belonged to an English family from Quebec City. George had an increasing hunger to deepen his own spirituality. He had a profound devotion to Jesus in the Eucharist and to the Blessed Virgin Mary. He became a member of the Society in 1848 in Montreal, the year the first Conference was founded there, through the inspiration of Bishop Bourget. The bishop had heard about the Society on a visit to Paris and brought back with him a copy of the Rule and Manual of the Society. In 1849, when Mr. Muir's work brought him to Quebec City, he requested admittance to the Quebec City Conference and was unanimously admitted. He used to visit the Quebec City Jail. One day, when he invited a woman prisoner to turn her life around. The woman told George "What's the use? Even if we tried to live a better life, we'd never make it. Once we're in trouble, there's no way out, and no one wants us around. When we get out of jail, there's no place to go except back to our old haunts...."

George Manly Muir (1807-1882) Initially the idea of helping women being released from prison was not well received. However, Mr. Muir managed to get support from his fellow members in the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and opened a shelter for women who, on leaving jail, expressed the wish to lead a Christian life. In 1850, Muir's employment took him to Toronto, and he was asked by the Quebec Council to try and found a Conference in Toronto. Having arrived in Toronto, Mr. Muir attended daily Mass at St. Michael's Cathedral and noticed several other men who also attended Mass and received holy communion daily. One by one, he approached them, and they agreed to meet to discuss the founding of a Conference. As a result, the first Ontario Conference (the Conference of Charity of Our Lady of Toronto), was formed at St. Michael's Cathedral in Toronto, on November 11, 1850. Mr. Muir was soon transferred back to Quebec and was elected President of the SSVP National Council. He remained in Quebec until his death in 1882. The Society continued to expand in Ontario with the establishment of the Conference Notre-Dame de la Merci (bilingual) in Ottawa in December 1860. Three years later, the first francophone Conference was founded at the Notre-Dame du Bon Secours Parish (now Cathedral-Basilica) of Ottawa. The Society expanded to many other Ontario communities. Today in Ontario the Society has some 5,000 members in over 335 conferences that reach out to over 66,000 families. By learning more about our Vincentian ancestors we see where we have come from and why we do what we do. We ask their intercession as we look forward and pray that their dedication to Christ by serving His poor inspires us to do the same in our Vincentian work.

"Milestones in our History" (Individual)

An Interview with Agnes Turley, one of Halton's longest serving members. By Guido Kelly

- 1. How long have you been a Vincentian? and how much have you enjoyed this aspect of Vincentian work? I have been a Vincentian for over 35 years. I started as an Auxiliary Member at St. Francis of Assisi Conference in Mississauga when our children were young. I then became a fully active member, and it was very humbling and gratifying to help our Friends (brothers and sisters in need). When I assisted our Friends, I truly felt that I was being Christ to them and that I was experiencing God's love in action. It was an overwhelming feeling.
- 2. Since being a Vincentian is a vocation, who or what motivated you to join the Society? As a child growing




- up in Ireland, I saw how my father assisted SSVP in our local Parish. I was later inspired by my late husband Oliver, who was a member at St. Francis of Assisi Conference in Mississauga for many years. When I saw how much he loved serving our Friends, I became an auxiliary member as I was busy raising our 6 children. When the time was right, I felt I needed to put more of myself out there by becoming more active and it was beautiful to work with volunteers who truly felt called to give of themselves to assist our Friends.
- 3. As Vincentians, we serve with "Love, Respect, Justice and Joy". Which of these motivates you the most? Why? It is hard to choose just one, but Love reigns. We choose to become Vincentians because we love God. We bring this love to His children who may be less fortunate in material needs. By being a joyful person and treating everyone with respect, we become Christlike, who judges no one but embraces everyone. I love the feeling I get every time I help a family and see the appreciation and happiness on their faces and sometimes relief because we have lifted them up out of an untenable situation.
- 4. What leadership positions have you held with your Conference or Council? Of which are you most proud? Why? Throughout my years with SSVP, I have served as Secretary of a Conference and a Particular Council, Treasurer for the Ontario Regional Council and President of our Local Parish Conference here at Holy Rosary in Milton. I enjoyed all these experiences because I was working with like-minded Catholics, people who gave of their time and talent without looking for anything in return. I loved attending the meetings and spreading the joy I felt at being able to serve. Each position brought its own unique experience. Through these roles, I learned that I could be a leader and be responsible for providing guidance and encouragement to my peers. I always received much more than I gave.
- 5. Drawing from your vast experiences over the years, what aspect continues to motivate you in your Vincentian work? I feel very blessed by all that the Lord has given me. Although I am unable to be as active as I once was, I still benefit greatly from the assistance I still provide. As a priest friend once said, "The poor are hard taskmasters". Because we know how it is hard for our Friends to ask for help, by the outpouring of our empathy and humility, we allow them to maintain their dignity. Again, God's Love in action. During the "Covid" outbreak, we found ways to work around the precautions to help these Friends. The resilience of our volunteers was and is awe inspiring.
- 6. What advice do you wish to share with "new" as well as "not so new" Vincentians as they respond to the wide-ranging calls for their service? The poor will always be among us, and we cannot turn a blind eye to them. We need to step out in Faith and embrace the gifts and talents God gave us. Do not be afraid as God will provide the courage you need to meet them where they are. We have to remember that we are offering our Friends a "hand up" and not a "handout" there is a big difference here. By become a Vincentian you are embracing some of the Corporal Works of Mercy. We are not there to judge them but to offer them a hand given in love. You will not be disappointed as your will gain many graces and blessings and a sense that you have heard God's call and acted upon it. Here I Am Lord! I would encourage my fellow Vincentians as they approach each encounter with those in need, that they should always recognize the great joy in helping others and being a true reflection of Jesus Himself to those being helped. Also, always pray that God will grant them the grace to have a positive attitude in responding to their needs.

St. Mary's Conference, Lindsay

Celebrates 150 plus years of SSVP Service

The community of St. Mary's Church, Lindsay began in a small log building in 1840. The first Mass in the present brick building was celebrated on Christmas Eve 1859. Many of the building supplies were donated or transported by



parishioners with over 600 bricks hauled to Lindsay in buckboards. Parishioners have had a long history of serving their Church and their community. Our SSVP St. Mary's Conference was started about the 1870's serving our Neighbours in Need through a variety of support systems and activities. We now have seven teams of two which operate on a rotational basis and make the home visits when called on. We assist with a variety of needs for food, shelter, health or education. Our members also volunteer in a local soup kitchen and the local food bank on a regular basis. Financial support of both a local shelter for the homeless and a pregnancy centre is ongoing. Members meet to weave milk-bag mats for the Canadian Food for Children's mission. Students are supported through our Back-to-School program and offer \$500 bursaries to two graduating secondary school students who have triumphed over trials. In addition, we assist financially with help for students to attend camps, World Youth Days, school excursions and with the Seeds of Hope program (RESP). We also reach out to our four parish schools offering additional (up to \$1,000) financial

students (such as eyeglasses or snowsuits). Monthly collections at each Mass and bequests have provided the base revenue for the work of St. Mary's Conference. For over 25 years, St. Mary's Conference has offered a Christmas program to assist families and individuals to celebrate with good food. The program initially provided turkey or ham, bags of fresh and canned groceries, bread, milk and potato chips. Since 2001, Lindsay paramedics volunteered to deliver the food to families in partnership with St. Mary's Conference and they continue to do so. We engage our parishioners to provide a new clothing item and/or a toy for a child through the Be-An-Angel program at Christmas by taking a child's request from our tree. This has become a very popular item



with our parishioners who have been very generous since its 2003 start. An Adopt-a-Family program attracted additional businesses and families to provide gifts for each member of the home. Members and secondary students assisted

We are truly blessed to have 36 active and 21 auxiliary

members who assist us in our ministry. They serve the needs of our community with empathy, humility and generosity. It takes a village to raise a child or family, and we are forever grateful to each one of our parishioners and our community partners for their help. *Joanne Hough, President, St. Mary's Conference, Lindsay*

Holy Rosary Conference, Milton

Celebrates

40 plus years of its Formation

Our Holy Rosary Parish in Milton was established in 1936. As the Town of Milton grew, so did the number of families that the parish served and continues to serve today. We are 7000 families strong. The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul



has been active at Holy Rosary since the 1980's. Like all organizations from that era, there have been many changes. When we started out, we would bring some toiletries, dish and laundry detergents and non-perishable items to our Friends in Need along with a food voucher to one of our local grocery stores, thus enabling them to purchase fresh fruits, meats and vegetables. Initially, we did not experience many families seeking assistance. However, as Milton began to expand after the year 2000, the number of families needing assistance also grew. We soon realized that many of those that we helped

were more of a multicultural population. This changed the needs of some of our families as the food items we usually handed out were not the same as their customary diets. Hence, we continued with providing toiletries but the donations of nonperishable foods that we received and handed out were not being used. We then

decided that we would not hand out these items but continued with toiletries and handed out vouchers to the grocery store instead, so our friends may make their own food choices. We are blessed with very generous parishioners and one of our families holds a Family Skating Day to celebrate Family Day every February. During that time, they ask the

participants to bring toiletries



to assist the families helped by SSVP. During the Covid crisis, we had to re-evaluate our assistance to the families in need. We are a steady Conference with 14 members(13 full, 1 aux.). We average 10 to 12 calls weekly. During the past year, we assisted a total of 139 families thru 531 total visits comprising 185 adults and 85 children. Each August, we provide school supplies to the families with school-age children. This past Christmas, we assisted 85 families (50 children) with food, gift cards and fresh produce donated by a parishioner. We are also twinned with two Conferences, one in the mountains of Peru and the other in Dominica. Last year we helped our Dominica twin with a special agricultural project there. All our members continue to serve our friends in need with unlimited time and lots of energy.

The presence of the Holy Spirit is truly alive among our members as we ensure that our families do not go "without". What Frederick Ozanam started in 1833 in Paris, France, continues to bloom today in Milton, Ontario. Holly Marshall, President, Holy Rosary Conference, Milton

St. Mary of the Assumption Conference, St. Catharines

Celebrates 65 plus years of SSVP Service

St. Mary of the Assumption Roman Catholic Church was built in 1912 and is located in west St. Catharines. It is truly the



Beacon on the Hill, that is "Western Hill" as the neighbourhood is commonly referred to. We are a vibrant Catholic community here in St. Catharines and are a part of the Roman Catholic Diocese of St. Catharines, which comprises the Regional Municipality of Niagara and the County of Haldimand, of Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Municipality. Due to the rising demands from those less fortunate and the need that they were seeking, our Conference was formed in the late 1950's. We use the church basement hall to greet our neighbours in need every Wednesday afternoon. With the help of 10 volunteers involved with the handouts, we offer them assistance with groceries, gift cards and clothing items. The need has never really slowed down. This means that our Conference is kept busy at most times. This past year we assisted 191 adults and 115 children. We offer them assistance due to the immense generosity of our parishioners, food drives by our 4 local schools, clubs, church organizations (Knights of Columbus and CWL), other churches and local businesses. This past year we prepared 84 Christmas hampers

consisting of non-perishable food items, Christmas treats, gift cards (which may be used to purchase turkey or ham), milk, bread, carrots, potatoes, apples and hygiene products. Gifts and gift cards were given to 84 children. Seniors received hampers as well as stockings filled with gift cards, socks, chocolate, hygiene products etc. Within the parish, we gather food items on a weekly basis, collect monetary donations and conduct frozen food drives.



These methods of collecting the items that we use for the hampers and stockings are required to ensure that we meet the demands. For the year 2024, our priest, who is also our Spiritual Advisor, has suggested that we investigate the supply of Easter baskets to some of the people that we help at Christmas. We have also supported the North of 60 project

We are partnered with Naujaat, Nunavut and pack and ship a container full of "goodies" for their use. Chez Marie, a temporary home for refugees, is

As Sarnia/Lambton grows and welcomes newcomers from other parts of Canada and also from across the globe, the SSVP retail thrift stores of Sarnia/Lambton offer everyone with high quality household goods, clothing, furniture, and electronics. As more and more people focus on sustainable retail practices as well as the cost of goods, they may find a variety of gently used and new items available at our stores. At our warehouse, our staff and a few volunteers

are continuously sorting and preparing donations received for the retail stores. Damaged and/or irreparable are set aside and sold as bale. By donating good quality items to us for reuse, they stay out of landfills, and our clients are the winners as they get the chance to enjoy good as new quality household products, furniture, and electronics. Our food bank makes sure that everyone, regardless of their social status, is able to enjoy the experience and essentials that our SSVP stores have to offer through our voucher program. The 5 retail stores and warehouse are

Also, a Priest who spoke English translated the Catechesis session, the experience was reflective and inclusive! Despite the crowds, the gathering of so many young people was refreshing and hopeful for our Catholic Church and humanity. We attended the Adoration along with 500,000 others and our team was blessed to have been on the front lines to view the Arrival of Pope Francis! The privilege of being so close to his Holiness brought so many of us to tears. Two million people attended the Papal Mass. This was a great conclusion to our faith journey. Feeding the Hungry in Windsor-Essex

<u>"STREET OUTREACH to the chronic HOMELESS."</u>

Agapao Proseuche (Love & Prayer) started with the vision of one man (Joe Ouellette) in the winter of 2021. It began with Joe providing \$20 bills to those he found on the streets experiencing homelessness so that they could buy a hot meal and provide blankets, coats & boots for these individuals. This then built to Joe building meal bags for this community and was able to expand to servicing upwards of 40 meal bags by the spring of 2022. Joe reached out to the SSVP for support of this project and as such the SSVP Street Outreach project was born. With the help of volunteers from the Good Shepherd and St John Vianney



conferences in the packing of bags as well as the Central Council in financial support towards providing food cost reimbursement, we started up. In the summer months the deployment of meal bags increased to 50 meal bags every Sunday and 50 snack bags every Wednesday. By August 2022, this had increased to 60 of each bags. Tents and sleeping bags were donated and then distributed during these months. Joe stepped back from the day to day operations in November 2022 and the SSVP then assumed full control of this project. We are now 36 volunteers across the spectrum

of society and religious beliefs and continue to recruit volunteers to enable us to better serve those people in need of our support. The "Street Outreach WE" developed a "Vision" and a "Mission". Our VISION: Act with dignity, compassion and humility to provide to the homeless, with their consultation, security of self, security of property, securing of physical and mental wellbeing and the dignity of private living-space. Our MISSION: Encounter with dignity and respect those homeless individuals in need and provide to them, those resources which we have on hand and available at that moment and in that

moment. A special thanks to the dedicated staff at the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul store on Lauzon Road for sorting all the donations (coats, boots, blankets & sleeping bags) for us this past year and getting them ready for distribution. We thank the many that donated warm clothing and boots as we ensured that the homeless are outfitted for the winter months. We also help individuals to connect with the Windsor Essex Housing and the Canadian Mental Health Association so that they could be added to the Names First listing for housing and receive the needed mental health support. At times, we also help set-up tents by our "boots on the ground" (22 total) deployment team members. A typical bag handout would include water bottle, juice box, Gatorade, homemade cookies, dessert items, granola bars, protein bars, tuna kit, 2 clementines, banana, fruit cup, chips, 2 pairs of new socks, new underwear, gloves, handmade toque & scarf, coffee card, personal



toiletries, wet wipes and hand sanitizer. Year 1 to Year 2 saw a 222.4% increase in the number of food bags we distributed. We will help over 5,000 people for year end 2023 and an even larger number in 2024. Some of our very generous donors include St Pius X students, who decorated over 500 bags, members of St Clements, Good Shepherd, St Anne's, St John Vianney, Our Lady of Atonement, St Simon St Jude, Holy Name of Jesus SSVP, Windsor East PC and WE Central Council. Also, the St Anne's CWL for the collection of warm clothing & gift cards. St Louis family (Good Shepherd) for the donation of the McDonald coffee cards. Homelessness and Poverty-Can SSVP do more?

Homelessness in Ontario and across Canada is a growing concern for governments, municipalities, and organizations such as the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul. As Vincentians, we often engage with our neighbours in need in their home, or through a thrift store, food bank or community meal. However, do we seek out those without a home to listen and learn about their challenges finding basic food and shelter? Is there more we can and should be doing? I would recommend we discuss ways we may do more. This may mean collaborating with other like-minded organizations that do provide such outreach services.

We can also do more by gathering existing statistics and related information to educate ourselves about homelessness. Our newspapers and media outlets continuously report on this unfortunate circumstance that is quickly becoming or has become a plague across our province and our country. There are several factors that affect poverty which in turn can lead to homelessness. These include poor education, sudden illness, other health afflictions and lack of proper care. In addition, lack of employment or low paying jobs, substance addictions, trauma from family abuse history, inadequate social services support, and criminal justice issues all contribute to the spider's web of homelessness.

In addition to the factors just outlined, there is an over representation of people who identify as BIPOC (black, Indigenous people of colour) that are affected by the homelessness plague. When racism is an added factor and the burden of discrimination raises its ugly head, it becomes a huge challenge to overcome. This over representation is demonstrated in food bank usage, social services and the criminal justice system. The Indigenous population whether living on First Nations land or in an urban setting, faces many such barriers. This is precisely why we should include systemic racism in our social justice efforts to advocate and act for change. The Public Policy Dialogue & Development committee shall place a focus on homelessness and poverty in 2024.
