Camp Vincent

Camp Vincent, also known as St. Vincent de Paul Camp, is a residential summer camp for children ages 6-15 yrs old. We accommodate over 700 children each summer from all walks of life, regardless of social, financial, or faith backgrounds. We strive to provide an outdoor program that helps children grow in mind, body, and spirit through positive mentorship, education, and outdoor activities! Contributions from the community play a critical role in the continuing experience of our campers.

The camp was established by the St. Vincent de Paul Society in 1974, approximately 4 miles east of Thamesville, Ontario. The camp is located in one of the largest and most significant forested areas in southwestern Ontario for size, diversity, forest cover and rare species. Known as Bothwell Forest or "Skunk's

Misery", the area contains many unique opportunities for the observation of wildlife that is seldom found anywhere else!

Camp Vincent consists of approximately 69 acres, over half of which is forested. Some of our many activities include swimming, hiking, canoeing,

archery, arts (crafts, art, dance, music, and drama), nature discovery, campouts, sporting activities, wagon rides, and camp-wide games. One of the most significant aspects of our camp, and the driving force behind all of our activities is the weekly theme and programming. Each week, campers embark on a themed adventure through the use of games, characters, story lines, and props. Our various activities revolve around a particular theme and encourage campers to become characters in a unique story!

Advocacy Committee — Voice of the Poor!

The Advocacy Committee of Toronto Central Council has assumed the role as the Voice of the Poor Committee for the Ontario Regional Council. Recognizing the similar issues at the local and provincial levels, Regional President Jim Paddon asked us to expand our scope to serve all of Ontario's Vincentians and neighbours in need.

We know that advocacy works. Recently the City of Toronto proposed to sell off their stock of stand-alone affordable housing units. Eleven of

these properties were leased by Toronto Central Council to house people who are in addiction recovery. The media attention as well as letters, telephone calls and emails from Vincentians all played an important role in persuading the City to reverse its decision and allowed us to continue this important special work project. We look forward to similar results regionally.

We must educate our parishioners and communities about the challenges faced by the people we serve. We must

fight for social justice in specific areas such as affordable housing and social assistance reform. Our efforts will help to improve the quality of life for our neighbours in need in both the short and the long term. See the Advocacy page on the Regional website for further information.

Partnership with Muslim Community for Christmas Hamper Program

In a partnership built on the true spirit of giving, members of the London Muslim Mosque helped a Roman Catholic Church drive gather enough food to help nourish more than 100 families this Christmas season.

Moe Lacerte, President of the St. John the Divine Conference, reached out to the Muslim community after making a home visit to a Muslim family where language was a barrier. He made a number of inquiries to see how our Catholic organization and the Muslim community could work together

to help our friends in need. The result is a beautiful partnership was formed.

Moe was extremely pleased and grateful when he saw the many boxes of food that had been collected to help families in need. Most of the 30 boxes were collected by children at the Is-

amic School. Donations were also made by members of the Western University's Muslim Student Association.

This was the first year Moe had reached out to the Muslim community. He said, "We all want the same

things: peace and respect."

Mosque members welcomed the request with joy, said Ali D. Chahbar, who helped organize the drive with Zeba

Hashmi, head of the Outreach Committee.

"To us, the spirit of Christmas is the spirit of brotherly love, why wouldn't we want to be a part of it?" Chahbar said he noticed the spirit in December as he left a shop with items for his daughter to make a ginger-

bread house. "It is so nice. People are really different. They are nicer and you notice it," he said. "I wanted to get a megaphone and shout 'Can we keep this going all year, people?'"

"We are not Christians and don't celebrate Christmas but we are engulfed by the spirit and any time there's a jubilant harmonious feeling, whatever creed it is under, we thrive on it," he said.

It is interesting to note that the Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue issued a Vatican messages for the end of Ramadan in 2010, 2011 and 2012. The Muslim community who helped collect food donations were very aware of this Vatican message; however, many Catholics do not seem to be. The 2012 message was entitled "Educating young Christians and Muslims for justice and peace".
