Peel North Helps with Philippines Relief

In November 2013, tragedy struck the Philippines. The world's hardest hitting typhoon on record destroyed much of the nation, claimed the lives of over 6,000 and displaced over 16 million people. Those who survived had no food, water, shelter, or clothing other than what they were wearing.

Our Particular Council wanted to do our part to help; having done this before in 2010, we knew exactly what to do.

An e-mail request was all it took. Shipping boxes were ordered and materials started coming in. Our shipper sends the boxes directly to families in the Philippines.

A Philippine friend of ours, Mary Ann, provided the names and addresses of those in need. Mary Ann even made phone contact and got their input as we filled the boxes. With help from Mary Teng from St. Leonard Confer-

ence as well as Tom Reilly, John Fitzgerald, Henderson Veira, Jackie Maisonneuve, Shirley and myself in less than one weekend, there were 12 boxes ready for shipment and eight more waiting for addresses. More empty boxes were ordered for the Monday.

Knowing many were without homes, we purchased 33-10' X 12' tarpaulins. St Leonard's Conference donated a lot of food, and Shirley purchased about 20-8kg bags of rice, powdered milk, coffee and peanut butter as well as small first aid kits. There were donated school supplies and backpacks. One of our local schools brought a large amount of summer clothes and shoes. A generous donation came from a bordering conference.

We got great support from our Vincentians, congregation and the Ontario Regional Council, without whom we could do very little.

Their participation in social justice activities throughout the day, including participating in a 'soup line' provided by St. Vincent de Paul volunteers, was a true example of young people living their faith. The early winter weather, (including a brisk wind!), certainly

helped drive the point home that homelessness and poverty are both issues our society urgently needs to address.

The funds personally raised by the students, in excess of \$2740, were donated to the Mary Mother of God Conference in recognition that everyone deserves to live in dignity. Thank you Holy Trinity students for thinking INSIDE the box!

According to research we have come up with the following list: St Michael's Cathedral Conference, Toronto 1851; St Paul's Conference, Toronto 1853; St Patrick's Conference, Peel South 1859; St Basil's Conference, Toronto West 1859; St Peter's Cathedral Conference, London 1863; St

Joseph's Conference, Ottawa 1864; St Basil's Conference, Brantford 1866; Our Lady Immaculate Conference, Guelph 1872. And a special mention of the oldest Isolated Conference: St Joseph's Conference, Stratford 1879.

Three Conferences have their information into become aggregated. Also a special welcome to St Theresa Courtice and Frances Xavier Brockville who will send in their aggregation papers as soon as they have been going for a year.

We still have 8 Conferences who have been active for several years and have not yet applied to become aggregated. We hope they join the Vincentian as full members soon.
