Welcome to Marillac Place!

Marillac Place, a Saint Vincent De Paul Special Works Conference, is a home for moms and babies located in Kitchener, Ontario. Over the last 22 years we have housed a multitude of moms from different backgrounds, with their own unique life story, but all with limited financial resources, in need of a place to live and people to care about them. For these moms, Marillac Place becomes their home and the staff become their support system.

We can house up to 10 mothers between the ages of 16 to 25 and 11 babies. Moms can stay a maximum of 12 months which may start any time prenatal up to when the baby is two years old. This extended length of stay makes us unique and provides the moms time to make significant changes in life and to grow into independent women.

It takes individual hard work and commitment from the moms. All the

moms are responsible to do their share of cooking, cleaning, keeping their bedroom tidy and in general maintaining the house in good order, as well as attending weekly in-house meetings.

Our Residential Counselor works closely with each mother, helping them to set and achieve their goals. She co-ordinates with community support groups and agencies to ensure the mothers are receiving the help they need.

Our Program Manager spends time each day with mothers, helping them to gain valuable life skills catered to the particular needs of the residents at the time.

As a life-changing experience, the mothers work very hard to achieve their goals, whether it is to parent alone, parent with the support of family, regain custody, or to place their child up for adoption. Our role is to support the mothers as they make these important decisions and prepare

they were extremely grateful. We are hoping that we can continue to build a relationship with the people in Attawapiskat.

FAITH, FRIENDS and HUMBLING WISDOM

Five years ago I became a member of Holy Family Conference. I did not one day "know" that I needed to join. I was asked by a friend, who is a member and felt I might be a good fit, to come and check out a meeting. Since then, I have gained knowledge and compassion for those we call our "Friends in Need".

I want to share a little of what I've learned.

A report by the Ministry of Health stated those living with mental illness are the most frequent repeat users of our hospital emergency system. I think I understand why.

Years ago, the government reduced the number of in-patient psychiatric beds. As a result, many who live with this invisible illness must live in "normal" society with outpatient support.

Society expects everyone who looks "normal" to be able to manage an average daily life. This places huge pressures and expectations on those afflicted by mental illness.

Some lack control of their emotions and behaviours; others cannot get a job because of the stigma associated with their diagnosis; some live on welfare; and some live in low rental housing which has its own negative realities. Some employers will not hire persons with a subsidized

housing address.

Many can't keep friends due to recurring symptoms. The friends they do have are often others in the same situation...they understand each other's plight. Negative habits such as drinking and doing drugs allow temporary escape from the realities of life. Many are ostracized by their families because of their illness-related behaviours.

The strong medications prescribed have side effects intolerable to many, so they stop taking them and symptoms return. The cycle starts again, which prompts the emergency visit.

In the ER, they see staff who know them from previous visits and

consider them "friends", looking forward to seeing them again. Here they feel acceptance, even if it is only because staff show them the care and compassion.

Society sees the results of all this, and judges.

I thank God that I have learned these things and that my understanding of mental illness has grown, in part due to my SSVP membership. I believe I am a better person for it.
