Leo's Linens

Strathroy-Caradoc and Adelaide-Metcalfe municipalities lie west of London, Ontario. It is the largest population in Middlesex County, about 25,000 people.

Our community has a high population of seniors requiring care that is either not offered or not affordable at facilities in the area. The pension they live on is often not sufficient for their daily needs due to high cost of medications and medical intervention services.

Research has proven that people who struggle to purchase diapers for children often leave them in dirty and wet diapers for prolonged periods of

time. The child becomes irritable and inconsolable which in turn causes the parents to become frustrated and possibly react physically.

There is the same scenario for poverty-level adults, often the disabled and elderly who require hygiene products on a continuous basis.

Strathroy All Saints Conference feels that providing hygiene products to the home will keep babies/toddlers more content; adult disabled will feel more confident about attending work and social activities; seniors will be less agitated due to physical discomfort.

Our volunteers meet clients at Strathroy SSVP Economy Shop, a retail outlet well known in the community. The Shop contributes to Strathroy's central food bank, run by the Salvation Army.

In June 2014, we did a community press release and appeal for donations. On June 24th, we launched the program which will be active the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month. Clients may receive product bi-monthly.

After two sessions, product was pro-

vided to five families with seven children, plus three adults. Another client has been identified as a result of a home visit.

And for those wondering, we have named the project in honor of one of our long-term volunteers Leo Verberne; he has been active with the Society for 37 years and counting.

First I am pleased to say that the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul along with the Conference of Canadian Catholic Bishops is an active founding member of the Catholic Connections in Restorative Justice (www.ccinrj.ca). There are many issues related to this long overlooked issue that we must as ad-

dress as true Vincentians.

The second news item is the formation of the St. Dismas project, which will be a systemic change project whose goal will be the formation of a special works conference in any council that is near a federal or provincial prison. Please be open and supportive of these two new options to serve our friends in need.

While actual prison visitations are not for everyone, there is also a huge need to assist former inmates during their re-entry into the community. In addition, the families of both current and former inmates often suffer many hardships not of their own doing.

We must also realize how important forgiveness and reconciliation is to the prison ministry.

Something I would like to share with all the presidents in ONRC is the addition of the newly created Presidents Resources website, located under Members Info, Presidents Site.

This password-protected site was built at the request of council and conference Presidents who were asking for a site similar to the Help site for Stores Managers. The basic framework and layout of the Stores site was used, and we populated it with some basic, common procedures

and guidelines to give you an idea of what might be carried there.

If you want to get access to this site, send an email to secretary@ssvp.on.ca (this will reach Geraldine's mailbox) and send her your name, your position, your council or conference name and location, and your email address. You will get an email back giving you a sign in name and password. Then go to Members Info, Presidents Site, open up the signup page, and sign in.

This website is just getting started; we talked about its possibility at the April Regional meeting, and introduced the basic look in Edmonton during the Ontario Regional meeting. At the September meeting in Barrie, we will look at the site (live and

online) again, and gather more information from you for future changes and adaptations.

But we need your help to build up this site, so send us your ideas to help grow and populate this site with material helpful to all presidents. John Ketelaars and I want this site to be as fluid and flexible as possible, and reflect what you want, not what we think should be there.
