Camp Vincent ... Come Play with Us!

Although we have had a trying year, we persevere and carry on. We want to thank our supporters and the Vincentimes for giving us the space to bring you up to date on all camp matters.

Our History

In 1970, Mr Joe Johns (whom we lost this year) along with Kent Deanery Particular Council members Emiel Laevens, Trefle Laprise, and Henry Faubert purchased the land that was to become Camp Vincent.

Since St Ursula's parish was building a new church, the PC purchased the old prefabricated church for \$1.00. It was disassembled and rebuilt on site to be used for camp offices, staff sleeping quarters and a large auditorium/recreation hall. Winter Works of the federal government participated by covering the wages of six staff to rebuild.

The chapel from St Joseph's Hospital property was also moved and converted to a craft hall and added a storage room to the back of it.

Washrooms and a large dining hall, with a kitchen and walk-in cooler were also constructed.

A provincial government grant of \$11,000 was used to build a 30'x40' pool.

A bequest from the DeShaw estate in the amount of \$65,000 was used to assist under-privileged children to attend camp, as well as for camp maintenance.

Camp was officially opened for the summer of 1971.

The first summer accommodated 71 children. Our current capacity of 724 children was soon achieved.

When the camp first opened, the charge was \$45 per week and children came from across Chatham, Windsor, Sarnia, London and surrounding areas. Today, children still come from these areas and beyond, including as far away as St Catharines. No child is refused at the camp.

What Do the Campers Say?

Shoestring Budget Breaks under Major Repairs

Like most non-profits and charitable organizations, we are used to operating on a shoestring budget ... but this year our shoestrings broke and we have been left with great debt. Our biggest challenge this year was the major repairs needed at camp.

In addition to replacing the original pool, which we still owe \$25,000 for by June 1st 2016, there were other related costs, such as tiling the area around the new pool to drain the land; landscaping around the new pool; and refilling the old pool.

Then there were some unexpected expenses this year: blocked toilet issues at four different cabins; blocked drains in the girls shower room; six full septic tanks which needed to be drained.

We were hoping to get away without any large capital projects in the

next two years in order to get back on track; unfortunately, there are some looming projects and the list of work keeps growing.

Our pool house, which holds all of the electronic equipment, is leaking and the roof must be replaced before this winter. It is long overdue and we cannot take the chance on ruining all the expensive new equipment.


The Director's house is in need of a complete new bathroom.

The nurses' quarters will also be in need of a new shower and removal of the old tub which is in a deplorable state. Thankfully the sink and toilet in the bathroom are okay.

The staff kitchen will need new fridges; the three in there now are very old and we've discovered black mold, so we must get rid of these.

They are scheduled to be picked up by the contracted company for the SaveON program. At least that part is free.

Much of the camp is in need of a good scrubbing and a new coat of paint. If we can get a group of volunteers together, they could help with this aspect ... there is still cost involved for supplies, but the alternative of hiring painters makes even the simplest tasks a major expense.

Saving Where We Can

Having a beautiful new salt water pool, a little larger than our original, sounds like a luxury. But the old pool was in no shape to be used anymore. Plus the children are really enjoying this upgrade and it should serve us well for many years to come.

We know there will be costs related to this pool and are doing what we can to keep these in check. For example, this year the pump ran 24-7 which resulted in an atrocious hydro bill. However, if we can install a programmable timer to shut the pumps down after the last swim of the day and restart before the first swim the next day, it could amount to considerable savings. We've also considered solar panels just to run the pumps, but the start-up cost for that is unattainable right now.

We like to re-use what we can, where we can. For example, we were able to re-use some of the fencing around the new pool. We also re-used the original pool house as it is a cement block building and very solid. The thought at the time was to use it temporarily and build a new one a little closer to the new pool, but again this is not in the cards as we see it now.

Save our Pool!

The original pool built in 1970 needed replacing, so a contractor was hired and we were gearing up for a great summer. Shockingly, the contractor did not uphold his agreement and there was great concern that the 2015 campers would not have a pool at all!

Thankfully, our community came to the rescue. Quality Pools stepped up to build the pool, coming on board on June 1st. Six weeks later, despite the wettest June in memory, they had a pool up and running. They also provided a large discount in supplies, as did Fox Pools, Shock Doctor who did the electrical, and Simpson's Fence who did the fencing and re-used as much of the old fence as they could.

While the pool was not ready for the first two weeks of camp, as we also had delays getting things inspected for the official opening, we had water activities planned in the canoe pond. But when it was all done, our new salt water pool was a hit with our campers. The children were ecstatic. They said it felt good on the skin and was warmer than the old 'cement pond'.

Working towards the Future

We have met with interested parties in London and came away from that meeting feeling that, barring our pool adventure, we were on the right track. A 3-year proper business plan is being worked on as we speak, with an ensuing budget and fund raising of utmost importance.

We need to find enough funding to fulfill our mandate and get a camp going that is self-sufficient and able to improve. An operating capital, which has never existed, needs to be implemented.

We are working on a letter to solicit donations and trying to find corporate sponsors.

Also, we have touched base with the Union Gas Retirees Volunteers worked on the Chatham Store with outdoor painting and landscaping two years ago. It is beautiful and has held up nicely. We know they do not have a project yet for this summer and they may be available

to spruce up the directors house with cleaning and painting. They usually have a large crew that comes out and can donate up to \$1000 for the project. So, fingers crossed, that they will be able to help the camp.

Despite this challenging year, we are still very optimistic for the future. We would like to thank everyone who has supported us, financially and in-kind, from individuals to companies.

Please support our camp as well as you can as we take up this large commitment to a new level which will guarantee that the camp will exist for years to come.

2016 Dates & Rates

The camp can accommodate 724 children and youth over the summer.

Although we subsidize many children through donations and conferences, we have adopted a voluntary tier program. Tier 1, at \$250/week, is our historically subsidized rate, but does not reflect the true cost of operating the camp. Tier 2, at \$300/week, is partially subsidized for those who can pay a little more. This rate more closely covers the cost of a week at camp, but does not take into account maintenance or future projects. Tier 3, at \$350/week, more closely accounts for the true cost of camp and includes a small additional amount for future projects and maintenance.
